	(Gen. 9:12). Think through some of the other biblical covenants and their
	associated signs. The sign of the Abrahamic Covenant was
	(Gen. 17:11). The sign of the Mosaic Covenant was the
	(Ex. 31:16-17). The sign of the New Covenant was
	(Luke 22:20; 1Cor. 11:25).

- In (Gen. 9:14-16) God promises never again to destroy all the earth's creatures with a flood. What problem does this merciful decision leave unsolved? The unfolding of the rest of the chapter depict the continuing problem with mankind. As you read the rest of Genesis and the Old Testament, we are pointed to God's ultimate solution. What is the needful solution to man's deepest problem according to (Gen. 3:15; Isaiah 53:4-6; Romans 5:17-19)?
- Moses interrupts his lengthy genealogy between Genesis 5 and 10 to focus on the life of one man. Why do you think he zooms in on Noah? What was God trying to teach us through the life of Noah? Interestingly, Noah does not have a single line in the unfolding drama about his life, but his actions speak louder than words. Write down some things you've learned so far from this biblical biography.
